The Year of St. Joseph

When reflecting on the earthly life of Jesus, it is striking and revealing that despite His intimacy with His Heavenly Father, and the Love shared between them, Jesus was denied at every turn of an easy, comfortable life. He was born into poverty in a cave in Bethlehem; at the Presentation, 40 days after His birth, the poverty of His family was further attested to by the fact that His parents gave the prescribed offering of the poor - two turtle doves; while still in infancy His life was threatened and the family lived as refugees in Egypt for a time; He was eventually despised and rejected by His own people; and, He suffered a gruesome, agonizing death on the Cross, seemingly abandoned by all except His Mother and a couple disciples at the foot of the Cross. None of the above would be what a parent would want for their child! However, despite the extreme difficulty throughout his life, there was one very notable thing Jesus was not deprived of - a loving home with a loving father, St. Joseph, and a loving mother, Holy Mary.

It would not have taken much editing of the story for Jesus to grow up in a single parent household. Joseph was after all pondering, at least for a brief time, putting Mary aside. Speculating even further, perhaps the plan of God could have been completely different and Jesus could have mysteriously appeared on the scene as an adult ready to begin His mission immediately. In other words, instead of the incarnation taking place from the first moment of life, it would have occurred later. Of course, I don't say any of that to merely drift off into wild hypothetical speculation. I say it because everything about Jesus' life is a model for us, including His family life with Mary and Joseph. It is therefore highly significant and revealing that the essential role of marriage and family is also attested to in the very life of Our Lord.

In the plan of God, the family is called to be a domestic Church - a privileged place of communion where the love of God can be experienced in a tangible way in the love between the spouses and shared with their children. It is the place of introduction into

prayer and mission to follow God. Together, Joseph, Mary and Jesus comprised the perfect domestic Church. They lived in communion with one another, persevered in faith and prayer, and were totally dedicated to following the will of God! The Holy Family is truly the model for all family life lived as a domestic Church!

On December 8, 2020, Pope Francis announced a special year in honor of St. Joseph on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of St. Joseph being named as the universal patron of the Catholic Church by Pope Pius IX. In a world which has grown more and more intent at deconstructing the values of masculinity, femininity, marriage, and family by dismissing any reference to the natural law as it pertains to them, shining a spotlight on St. Joseph and the Holy Family is more important than ever! As Pope Francis points out in his apostolic letter, Patris Corde, St. Joseph is a much beloved figure in the Church, a model father and spouse who was

tender, loving, accepting, creatively courageous, hard-working, obedient to God, and reflecting the Paternity of God the Father by his careful watching over and protecting of his precious child, Jesus.

As we all know too well, marriage and family life often get complicated and children are the ones who suffer the consequences of adult failures. Although we may fall short of the goal, let us pray that all families would truly strive to emulate the Holy Family, and let us pray in a special way that all fathers, husbands, priests, and indeed all men, would look to St. Joseph as a role model and guide to living their God given masculinity.

Our Lady of Corpus Christi (OLCC)

Retreat Center, located in Corpus Christi, Texas, seeks to implement SOLT's mission to bring "all peoples in union with the Trinity through discipleship of Jesus through Mary." Since the outbreak of COVID-19, our online apostolate has grown to meet the needs of our time.

One specific way we are fulfilling our mission is through a daily Liturgy Preparation video based upon the readingsfrom Mass. These videos are accessible on our social media platforms (OLCC Facebook, Instagram and Twitter) and on our website, ourladyofcorpuschristi.org. Liturgy Preparation, similar to letio divina, is a practice of prayer wherein the readings from Mass are reflected upon and the Holy Spirit is asked what He is teaching us through them. Each video is a fruit of prayer from the person featured and helps viewers to dive more deeply into the Scripture. Liturgy Preparation is a powerful way to pray, because it helps a person to prepare for Holy Mass. Fr. Jim Flanagan, the founder of SOLT, would often say, "We must live from Communion to Communion." This means we are called to spend half of our time in preparation for the Eucharist and the other half in thanksgiving for past receptions of the Eucharist. What better way is there to prepare to receive Jesus than by praying on the Word of God in the Liturgy for that day?

The SOLT Family Ecclesial Team and the way the priests and sisters loved and served the people with such joy and a familial spirit had me falling in love with our SOLT community. There was another unique aspect to the mission and the team: the lay missionary volunteers who came with such enthusiasm, love, and generosity of spirit. 

In a bold movement of the Holy Spirit

Pope Francis has declared a Year of St. Joseph which began on December 8th, 2020. How does the Pope describe the love of St Joseph for Jesus? He loves him with the heart of a father! By his virginal marriage to Our Lady, St. Joseph goes to Jesus through Mary so profoundly that Jesus calls him dad. St. Joseph was privileged to live in the presence of Jesus and Mary for many years. In a time when the world needs to rediscover the gift

of fatherhood, the successor of Peter turns our gaze to the man closest to Christ.

In *Patris Corde*, the letter released by Pope Francis to announce the Year of St. Joseph, he highlights that St. Joseph loved Jesus with a creative love. He is a great problem solver. On that first Christmas Eve, he kept knocking on doors with courage and patience looking for a place where his wife would give birth. With no room to be found, St Joseph chose the stable for shelter that night. Little did

he know, as the baby Jesus was laid in the manger, that many years later Catholic homes everywhere would have a manger scene. It is a witness of the love of God made present to us and the quick thinking of a father caring for his Child.

Want to be closer to Jesus and Mary? Go to Joseph. Pope St. John XXIII was convinced that St. Joseph himself greeted the shepherds and wise men and led them to Jesus and Mary. St. Joseph is the protector of the Holy Family and the first minister of Catholic hospitality. What he did for them he does for us. Would you like to have a baby? Need financial help? Need healing or help in relationships? Go to Joseph.

Jesus shares everything He has with us. At Calvary, He gave us His mother when he said to the disciple, "Behold your mother!" (John 19:27). In that same spirit of total self-giving, St. Joseph becomes our spiritual father. We are one in the Body of Christ with St. Joseph, because in Baptism, we are made one with Christ. St. Joseph continues even now to humbly serve the whole Church with joy.

In general, a father cares for his children in many hidden ways. St. Joseph is our spiritual father who desires to help us if only we draw near to him and ask. If we consecrate ourselves to St. Joseph, we are drawn deeper into the Holy Family, our imitation of Jesus and Mary becomes more perfect, and St. Joseph will take care of us as he took care of Our Lord and Our Blessed Mother. Imagine Mary telling Jesus the story of how St. Joseph persevered and found a place for His birth, Jesus can say with deep joy, "That's My dad!" Let us remember that we, like the child Jesus, are also in the care of St. Joseph and we too, can share His joy!
